Work Opportunities IDA

Application deadline extended to
Wednesday, June 18th! The Washington
Access Fund has teamed up with Seattle-King
County and Snohomish County Workforce
Development Councils to offer a new program



with grant money and employment counseling for people with disabilities.

With our Work Opportunities Individual Development Accounts (IDAs), jobseekers with disabilities engaged with a Seattle-King or Snohomish County WorkSource Center can save up for assets needed to overcome barriers to employment or self-employment. Assets are broadly defined to include, among others:

- Assistive technology;
- · Business equipment;
- Vehicles and other transportation-related needs;
- Information and communication technologies;
- Tuition, books, and other materials needed for education and training.

We will match every \$1 saved up to \$2,000. Save a dollar—get a dollar! If you save the maximum \$2,000 - that would mean you'd have \$4,000 to go towards your purchase goal.

This IDA program is funded through a Department of Labor Disability Employment Initiative grant. The sooner individuals sign up, the longer they have to save! We have extended the deadline and applications will be accepted through **June 18th, 2014**. Participants in the Work Opportunities IDA Program will be required to save for at least 3 months and a minimum of \$10 per month.
